BABU JAGJIVAN RAM: A CHAMPION OF SOCIAL JUSTICE AND EQUALITY

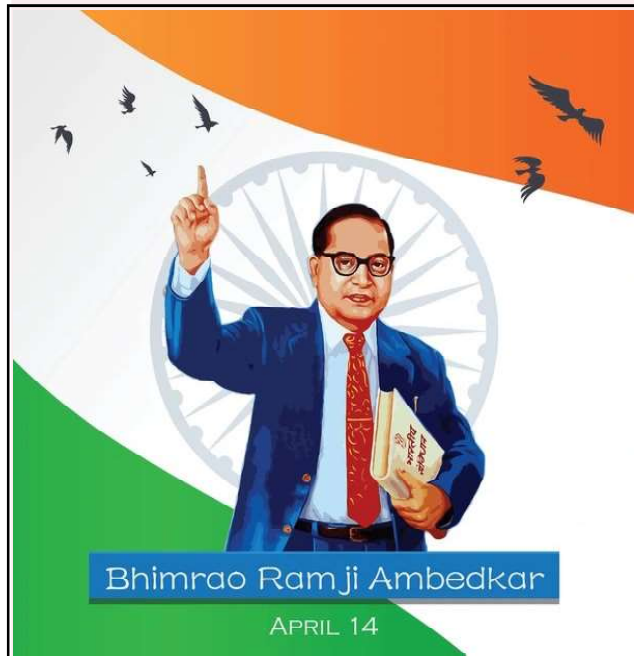

Dr. B. R. Ambedkar: Architect of the Indian Constitution



Dr. Bhimrao Ramji Ambedkar, popularly known as Babasaheb Ambedkar, was one of India's greatest social reformers, legal minds, and political leaders. Born on April 14, 1891, in Mhow (present-day Madhya Pradesh), he faced severe caste discrimination as a Dalit. Despite these hardships, Ambedkar pursued higher education, earning doctorates from Columbia University and the London School of Economics, becoming one of the most educated leaders of his time. Ambedkar dedicated his life to fighting caste-based discrimination, promoting social justice, and advocating for the rights of marginalized communities. He played a key role in drafting the Indian Constitution and is often called the "Father of the Indian Constitution." As the chairman of the drafting committee, he ensured that the Constitution guaranteed equality, freedom, and justice for every citizen, regardless of caste, religion, or gender. Apart from his legal and political achievements, Ambedkar was also a strong advocate for women's rights, labor reforms, and education. In 1956, he embraced Buddhism along with thousands of his followers, seeking a path free

from caste oppression. Today, Dr. Ambedkar remains an icon of social empowerment, and his birth anniversary is celebrated as Ambedkar Jayanti across India.

The Fundamental Rights of the Indian Constitution are enshrined in Part III (Articles 12 to 35) and guarantee basic human freedoms to all citizens of India. These rights ensure protection against arbitrary actions by the state and guarantee equal treatment and opportunities for individuals. Here's a brief overview of each of them:

Right to Equality (Articles 14–18): Article 14: Equality before law. All citizens are equal before the law.

Article 15: Prohibition of discrimination on grounds of religion, race, caste, sex, or place of birth.

Article 16: Equality of opportunity in matters of public employment.

Article 17: Abolition of untouchability.

Article 18: Abolition of titles (except for military and academic distinctions).

Right to Freedom (Articles 19–22):

Article 19: Protection of six freedoms – speech and expression, assembly, association, movement, residence, and profession.

Article 20: Protection in respect of conviction for offenses (protection against double jeopardy and self-incrimination).

Article 21: Protection of life and personal liberty (includes the right to live with dignity).

Article 22: Protect against arrest and detention in certain cases. Right against Exploitation (Articles 23–24):

Article 23: Prohibition of human trafficking and forced labor.

Article 24: Prohibition of child labor in factories, mines, or other hazardous employment.

Right to Freedom of Religion (Articles 25–28):

Article 25: Freedom of conscience and free profession, practice, and propagation of religion.

Article 26: Freedom to manage religious affairs.

Article 27: Freedom from taxation for promotion of any particular religion.

Article 28: Freedom from attending religious instruction in educational institutions.

Cultural and Educational Rights (Articles 29–30):

Article 29: Protection of interests of minorities (the right to conserve language, script, or culture).

Article 30: Right of minorities to establish and administer educational institutions.

Right to Constitutional Remedies (Article 32):

Article 32: Right to move the Supreme Court for the enforcement of Fundamental Rights. It allows individuals to approach the court if their rights are violated. These rights are fundamental, but they are not absolute and can be restricted under certain circumstances, such as in the interest of public order, morality, security, etc. The Directive Principles of State Policy (Part IV of the Constitution) also provide guidelines to the government, but they are non-justiciable (cannot be enforced in courts).

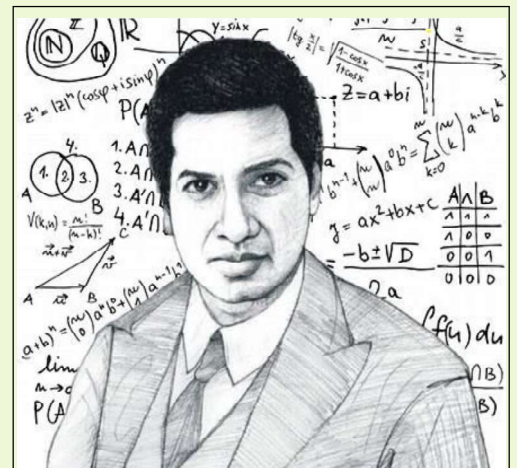

Maths Day: Celebrating the Beauty of Mathematics

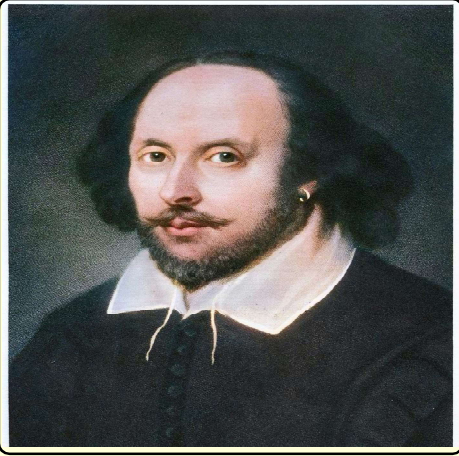
